On the second weekend of December, Rogers City high school students will present *The Curious Savage*, a gentle comedy about the unexpected, curious creature that is mankind. Wealthy widow Mrs. Ethel P. Savage has been placed into a home for the mentally unstable by her three exasperating adult children, who are determined to get their hands on their father's money.

Mrs. Savage encounters the sweetly unbalanced residents of the home, who have each retreated from the world into their own quirky reality. Comic mix-ups, eavesdropping and a weight loss trick involving playing cards lead to pandemonium that will leave the audience giggling and getting teary-eyed at the same time.

#### **Editor's Corner: New Voices**

This season's theatre newsletter, "Spotlight" is marked Volume 11, Number 4. That means, as your loyal newsletter editor, I have been involved in getting the news out about upcoming shows and the people who create them for at least eleven years. The earliest newsletter file in my possession dates back to 2009. That one covered our fabulous production of Escanaba in da Moonlight. It was labeled "Volume 2, Number 4." I know I wrote some earlier newsletters, but those files have been lost through the passage of time and multiple computer melt-downs. I do remember, during the previous year, searching the internet for dancing pajamas to illustrate The Pajama Game (Fall 2008). Earlier yet, I recall writing a "How'd They Do That?" article regarding our set for the play, Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum (Fall

2007). To prepare the Forum set, my husband Karl made Roman columns by recycling the foam liners that protected his ice cream shop waffle cone shipments. The cone box liners had protective ridges that looked just like fluting on a classical column, and were flexible enough to bend into a cylinder. To tell our readers about this thrifty and visually appropriate material, I wrote the phrase "The columns of Forum were formed of foam." We loved the tongue-twisting rhythm of that phrase, and it became on oft-repeated chant in our household. Are we theatre nuts? Yes, of course, and if you are reading this, you may be one too.

What I'm trying to describe is how much fun I've had over the years sharing theatre stories. But after more than a decade of hearing from me, it's high time to hear from new voices. I am extremely pleased to announce that Riconda Lamb will be taking over as Newsletter Editor for the 2019 theatre season and beyond. Riconda is certainly not new to the theatre enterprise (see the accompanying Community Characters story about Riconda, on page 3), but next year will be her debut organizing and editing our "Spotlight" publication.

However, as most of you know, Riconda comes from a newspaper family, so she has printer's ink in her bloodstream and lay-out talent in her fingertips. The transition to Newsletter Editor should be as smooth as it is welcome. Please give Riconda your thanks and support as she grapples with the new undertaking. You may even want to contribute a story from time to time. It's your theatre, too. Enjoy the show!

Riconda Lamb and Ava Kelly work lights and sound. Theresa Gibson serves as stage hand. Karl Heidemann is responsible for set design and technical direction, with Julie Riddle serving as the show's producer.

it is better to retreat from life's eccentricities or to live courageously among them. *The Curious Savage* accomplishes the rare feat of communicating profound truths while remaining playful and fun. The witty dialogue and endearing characters will delight audiences and offer an excellent training ground for the young actors.

Director Julie Riddle chose this play for the fall high school production because of the opportunities it will provide the cast members. A far cry from last year's fast-paced, hilarious *Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon, The Curious Savage* is full of well-rounded, lovable characters with strong inner lives that actors and director will be able to explore and bring to life.

"Theater offers students the opportunity to do more than just put on a fun play," Riddle said. "It encourages them to think deeply, climb inside someone else's head, experience compassion, discover truths... The people who make up *The Curious Savage* have much to teach us about ourselves. I can't wait to be amazed by what the high schoolers do with this lovely show."

Auditions for *The Curious* Savage will be held October 16 and 17. Performance dates are December 6-9, Thursday - Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday at 2:00 p.m.

#### **Community Characters: Riconda Lamb**

Riconda Lamb is no stranger to the Rogers City Community Theatre having experience as actor, director, crew member and ticket seller, as well as being a founding member of the Community Theatre Board. But as of the 2019 season, Riconda takes another role: Editor for the theater newsletter, "Spotlight."

As Editor, Riconda has no immediate plans for major changes in the newsletter, though she does hope to freshen up the graphics. In terms of articles, her favorite Spotlight piece is the director's synopsis of the upcoming play, because directors talk about their approach to the work, and what it means to each of them. Riconda also enjoys the How'd They Do That? piece, because it gives the public a glimpse of the offbeat, creative process involved in

putting a play on stage.

"I think the newsletter is an important part of our marketing and outreach program," says Lamb, who is also a member of the theatre's Marketing Committee. "We need to keep the theatre open and accessible to everyone in the community, so more people can get excited about our plays." It's that excitement that prompts new people to come join in the fun.

In Riconda's opinion, the future of the theater depends on bringing in those new faces, not just as actors, but as crew members and volunteers. "We need to make the theatre a safe place to learn new things." As an example, she points to the recent theatre skill workshops that gave young thespians the confidence to undertake new roles

and perform well under the stress of the stage.

While Riconda has enjoyed her own stage experiences, she values her Board membership as a way to help guide and support the future of the theatre. "I came to the theatre as an adult," she notes, "so I didn't have previous experience in other theatres. I just love being on the Community Theatre Board, and I even love the long two hour Board meetings, because I learn so much from the other members. They offer so many ideas and options on presentation methods and interpretation. It has really given me a broader perspective of the arts."

When not participating in Board meetings, Riconda can be found round about town,

#### **About Our Theatre**

The Rogers Theatre was constructed in 1937 as a classic, single screen, small town movie palace in the Art Deco style. After a fire in 1947, the theatre was re-built and expanded. Serving as a downtown landmark for decades, the theatre was purchased in 2003 by Karl W. Heidemann. The new owner added a stage, theatrical lighting and utility improvements. In 2004, live productions began alternating with first run movies, in a revitalized auditorium. In the summer of 2009, exterior restoration brought back the black and orange ceramic work of the original façade.

Once the stage was available, an informal group of local theatre fanatics emerged that now constitutes the Rogers City Community Theatre (RCCT). In 2006, a summer youth theater program began as well. Community cast members have ranged from age 6 to 94. New cast and crew volunteers are always welcome! In 2009, the RCCT incorporated as a Michigan non-profit organization and received IRS approval for federal non-profit status. Contributions are appreciated, and are tax deductible as allowed by law.

In 2013, a community-based fundraising drive provided support for installation of new theatre seating, sound system improvements, a digital 3-D projector and a new highly reflective screen. Additional sound and lighting equipment was added in 2017-18, keeping our theater at the cutting edge of stage and movie technology. In June 2016, Mary Ann and Karl Heidemann donated the theater building to the Presque Isle District Library for use as a community education and entertainment center, with a long-term lease for the Rogers City Community Theatre, ensuring access to theatre and fun for the next generation.
